

## E-Commerce (Electronic Commerce): Meaning

E-commerce means **buying and selling of goods and services using the internet**.

It allows people and businesses to perform commercial transactions online, without meeting physically.

For example:

- When you buy a mobile phone from **Amazon**, it is e-commerce.
- When you pay your electricity bill online, that is also e-commerce.

E-commerce makes trade **faster, easier, and more convenient** for both buyers and sellers.

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## Main Types of E-Commerce

There are **six main types** of e-commerce.

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### 1. Business to Consumer (B2C)

#### Meaning:

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## 2. Business to Business (B2B)

### Meaning:

In this type, one **business sells products or services to another business** using an online platform.

### Example:

- A computer shop purchasing laptops in bulk from **Dell's B2B portal**.
- A restaurant buying ingredients online from a wholesale supplier.

### Explanation:

B2B e-commerce usually involves **large transactions** and **long-term relationships**.

Products are often sold in **bulk quantities** and may include **software, machinery, or raw materials**.

B2B platforms focus on **efficiency, pricing, and delivery** rather than advertisements or discounts.

### Features:

- Fewer buyers and sellers, but bigger orders.
  - Long-term business relationships.
  - Negotiated prices and customized services.
  - Secure transactions and online quotations.
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## 3. Consumer to Consumer (C2C)

### Meaning:

Here, **consumers sell directly to other consumers** through an online platform.

The platform acts as a **middleman or marketplace**.

### Example:

- Selling old furniture or phones on **OLX** or **Quikr**.
- Selling handmade crafts on **Etsy**.
- People selling used books on **eBay**.

**Explanation:**

In C2C, normal users become sellers and buyers.

Websites or apps provide a place where people can list their products, set prices, and communicate with other buyers.

Payment and delivery are arranged between both parties or through the website's service.

**Features:**

- Individuals act as both buyers and sellers.
  - Platform earns commission or service fees.
  - Mostly used for **second-hand** or **unique** items.
  - Trust and safety features are very important.
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 **4. Consumer to Business (C2B)**

**Meaning:**

In this model, **individual consumers offer products or services to businesses**.

It is the **reverse of B2C**.

**Example:**

- A photographer selling stock photos to a company.
- A freelancer designing a logo for a business on **Fiverr** or **Upwork**.
- A social media influencer promoting a brand for payment.

**Explanation:**

In C2B, individuals use online platforms to provide their talents, skills, or digital assets to businesses that need them.

Companies can post requirements, and people can bid or offer their services.

**Features:**

- Consumers create value for businesses.
- Payment depends on work or contribution.

- Freelancing and influencer marketing are major parts.
  - Businesses get creative and flexible services.
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## 5. Business to Government (B2G)

### Meaning:

In this type, **businesses provide products, services, or information to government organizations** online.

### Example:

- IT companies providing software solutions to government departments.
- A company bidding online for a government contract through **GeM (Government e-Marketplace)** in India.
- Construction companies applying for government tenders online.

### Explanation:

B2G platforms allow companies to communicate and do business with government agencies securely.

The focus is on **tenders, project proposals, online bidding, and documentation**.

It improves transparency and reduces paperwork.

### Features:

- Involves government regulations and laws.
  - Deals with public contracts and procurement.
  - Requires official documentation and approval.
  - Secure and reliable systems are necessary.
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## 6. Government to Citizen (G2C)

### Meaning:

In this type, the **government provides services or information directly to citizens through online portals**.

### Example:

- Paying taxes online (Income Tax, GST).

- Applying for a passport or driving license online.
- Paying water or electricity bills on government websites.
- Using the **DigiLocker** app to store government documents.

**Explanation:**

G2C e-commerce improves communication between the government and citizens. It helps people access public services easily without standing in long queues. This system increases transparency, saves time, and supports **digital governance**.

**Features:**

- Easy access to government services.
- Transparency and efficiency.
- Online payment and document submission.
- Citizens can track applications and complaints.
